CATTLEYA LAWRENCEANA.

Amarvel ous consignment of C. Lawrenceana, just received, in excellent condition. This gorgeous Orchid is of easy culture, and very Iree-flowering, producing spikes with eight to the richly-coloured blooms. The plants are well-leaved, perfectly dormant, and very distinct; some have almost red, cohers dark green bulbs and leaves. Our Collector spent six months, and encountered many difficulties in gathering the plants, owing to several fieldinging the several fieldings as to be made partly by boat, partly on foot, through dense virgin forest, and occupies two munths; provision and beggage has to be carried by Indians. Returning, our Collectors had the misfortune to have one of their boats upset, losing thereby one of the crew, and a quantity of plants.
